
Center for Family Relations aka San Antonio Kids Exchange

In the midst of the adult world of parental conflict between divorcing, separating, and never married parents, children are all too often the silent victims. Many times, parents in these situations are too entrenched in conflict and too consumed emotionally to recognize that the emotional and sometimes physical, well being of the child may be in jeopardy. Many children feel responsible for their parent's divorce. When children hear and see their parents insult, give dirty looks, threaten and scream at each other, they bear the brunt of those attacks. Even when parents believe that they are not putting the children in the middle, children hear the arguing and experience the lack of affection between parents and therefore feel threatened. Their security is at stake. This creates internal emotional instability. Working in collaboration with the local courts, community agencies, and local police, the Center for Family Relations, aka San Antonio Kids Exchange, serves as a shield to protect our communities most precious asset — our children.

The Center is a non-profit organization, founded in 1997, dedicated to helping children and parents trapped in family conflict. Through supervised visitation, monitored exchange services, and educational programs, the Center makes it possible for children to develop healthy and appropriate relationships with both of their parents while keeping children out of the middle of parental conflict. Not only does the Center provide immediate services which protect children by taking parents out of direct contact with each other, but additionally, our trained staff work with parents to reduce conflict, awaken parents to the impact of their actions on their children, develop new skills, and change behaviors. The Center is motivated by research demonstrating that children who have a stable and consistent relationship with both parents have better psychological and emotional health, financial stability and overall well being.

The Center's programs are working, and our parents are learning the importance of putting their children first in divorce situations. Parents at the Center report a decrease in amount of conflict observed by their children, a decrease in their ex-partner's verbal aggression, a significant reduction in police and court involvement, and non-residential parents experience a significant increase in parenting time with their children. Supervised visitation and exchange programs reduce anxiety in children and parents, diminish or eliminate parental contact regarding child visitation and related issues, and allow families to see that there is another way to live. The Center for Family Relations served over 3,600 children and parents per year. The Center is located at 1818 San Pedro. Justice Rebecca Simmons

A pillar in our community as well as in our Judiciary, Justice Simmons so graciously gave me this exclusive interview to kick off our very own Equal Times "Spot Light" column.



The interview topics I chose were not the usual run of the mill interview questions posed to a Justice of a Court of Appeals. Instead, I opted for more personal topics that would allow us a peek beyond the Black Robe of this very AMAZING Justice! Here we go...

BS: Do you have favorite TV shows

RS: I do. First understand that I have a teenage son, so we're big "Doctor Who" fans. I got hooked on Doctor Who when I studied in England back in the 80's. So Doctor Who is back and we watch the new episodes. I also like other BBC period pieces like Downtown Ab-

bey, and any of the nature shows.

BS: What kind of music do you all listen to?

RS: We listen to a lot of different types of music because my son switches from pop to country and my husband and I like jazz and world music. Some of my favorite artists include the groups Gypsy Kings and Pink Martini.

BS: What about books, do have a favorite book?

RS: OK, I will reveal to you that the 4th Court has a monthly book club. So about once a month various members of the court and staff get together and we discuss a designated book over lunch. Some of the books we read include: *Wolf Hall* by Hilary Mantel, *Never Let Me Go* by Kazuo Ishiguro, and *Confessions of an Ugly Stepsister* by Gregory Maguire. For a scary page turner, the book *The Passage* by Justin Cronin is very intense.

BS: I have seen you on the runway at the Autumn Affair event and you looked fantastic, so what kind of style do you have going on behind the robe?

RS: I am not sure I have a style, but the clothes we get to model at the Autumn Affair are amazing thanks to Julian Gold. I put the case aside and focus on being thankful for the wonderful job I have and the great staff that supports the court. Tinkerbelle was right on when she told Peter Pan to think positive thoughts in order to fly.

BS: Justice Simmons - please share with us ... What is one thing that you do not fancy?

RS: OK, let's see ... I do not fancy lawyers who denigrate their fellow lawyers and the judiciary. Constructive criticism is ok, but personal attacks impact the entire judicial system. What client would trust the court system after their lawyer described opposing counsel as a thief and the judge as a bribe-taking idiot? That type of behavior does not promote the resolution of problems or confidence in the system.

BS: Why do you think it is important for us to communicate with the public and our community about the women's bar?

RS: I think it is important for the community to know how hard the members work to improve our legal community. Your members serve as role models not only to other women lawyers but also to the young women who are looking for careers and who are interested in the law.

BS: Justice Simmons I see you out at various events supporting our legal community. Do you have any women's bar events that you partake in?

RS: I will show my age; I have participated in events sponsored by the Bexar County Women's Bar Association since the inception of the group. I really enjoy going to the BCWBA Luncheons. I enjoyed the Bench Brunch and auction, and I am an even bigger supporter of the Autumn Affair. You may even catch me out on the runway as a fashion model for this year's event.

BS: Did you know the women's bar has a Mentor/Mentee program also?

RS: Oh yes, it has a great one. In fact, I am hosting the next mentor/mentee social event at my house on September 29th. I'll be doing some big time cleaning up before the event (smile). It is great fun to meet all the new and eager law students.

BS: Justice Simmons do you have a pet?

Community Service Column

"Will you marrow me?" One of San Antonio's newest charities is Marrow Match. When someone asks "Will you marrow me?", they are asking you "Will you save my life?"

Marrow Match is a non-profit organization devoted to growing the national donor registry of volunteer donors. Jason Cox, a San Antonio native and founder of marrow match, became a marrow recipient after his diagnosis with aplastic anemia, at the age of 9. Aplastic anemia is a condition in which bone marrow does not produce enough new blood cells for the body to sustain itself. Cox's life was saved when the bone marrow match came from his brother. He is now a local San Antonio athlete, actor and model.

There is an enormous search for bone marrow donors to save the lives of people that have been diagnosed with leukemia and other life threatening illnesses. Over 6000 people daily search the national marrow donor registry of volunteer donors for a match. There are many that are not able to find a viable match from a sibling. Those that cannot find a match within the family, are left with no other choice than to search the national registry.

The need for donors, especially of mixed heritages and ethnic minorities like Cox, led Cox to create Marrow Match in 2007. Cox's mother is of Latino descent. At the age of 33, Cox educates the public about bone marrow donation. He strives to raise awareness about the need for people to join the national Be The Match Registry. Cox is extremely passionate about Marrow Match. Many local businesses have held events in support of Marrow Match. BS: What kind of work did you do as a young lawyer, prior to becoming a judge?

RS: As a young lawyer I began my career as a briefing attorney for the Texas Supreme Court. I came to San Antonio in 1983 and became a shareholder at Cox Smith doing commercial litigation. In 1992, I moved to Akin Gump Strauss Hauer & Feld where my practice focused on intellectual property and antitrust litigation before becoming a district court judge in 2003, and an appellate judge in 2005.

BS: What is one thing that you really enjoy?

RS: I really enjoy my family. My husband and I have been married 28 years and we have a 16 year old son, Patrick, at home. Although my older daughter, Rachael, is teaching in Japan and my younger daughter, Sarah, is studying in Argentina, we visit a lot using Skype. I also really enjoy working at the Fourth Court of Appeals because you have time to think about the law and the people it serves. I have good colleagues and a very supportive staff.

BS: It was a pleasure getting to interview Justice Rebecca Simmons. She is such an asset to our profession. She really walks the walk, and not just on the red carpeted runway at the Autumn Affair.
